that if he makes a statement contrary to his own 1 well-being that he may be subjecting himself to 2 being charged in a criminal case, and that he has 3 under the Fifth Amendment the right not to 4 answer; am I correct? 5 MS. TIERNEY: Yes, sir, and also the right to 6 consult an attorney, and I understand he has 7 prior convictions, the consequences might be more 8 dire than one even can anticipate at this point, 9 and we're talking about --10 THE COURT: Do you understand what she's 11 saying, Mr. Moore? 12 THE WITNESS: Yes, sir. 13 MS. TIERNEY: Well, he can get life without 14 parole, but I don't know how many priors he's 15 got, but if he comes in here and says it's me 16 pals, then it's good-bye sunlight for the rest of 17 his living life, and he's young. I don't know if 18 this Court wants to countenance that at least 19 before he has a chance to talk to an attorney. 20 MR. KNIZLEY: Judge, he's already talked to 21 an attorney.
